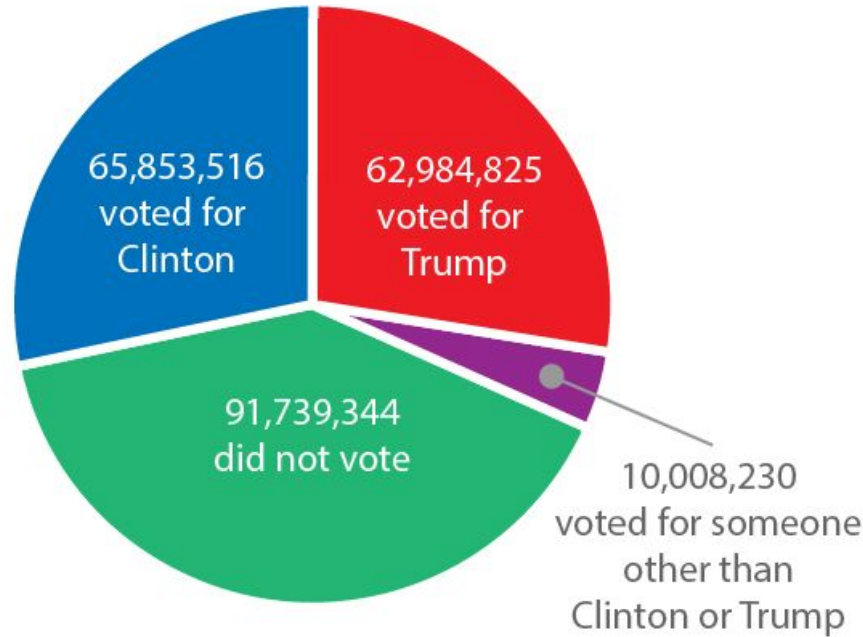

What if you voted early?



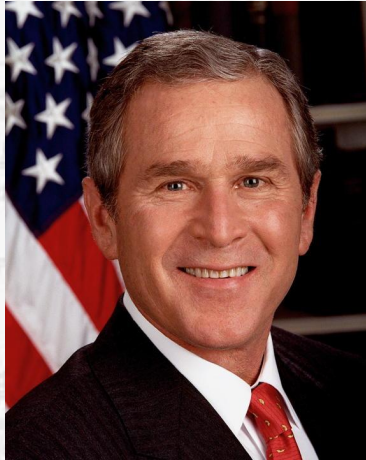

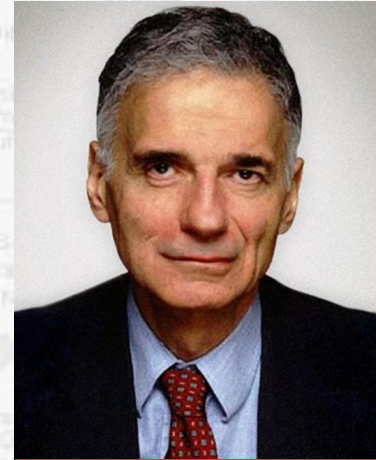

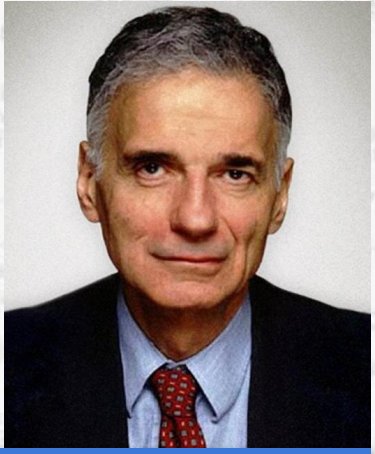

Effect on Elections

- Incumbents win 90% of the time - why?
 - “Electability”
 - Name Recognition
 - Fear of losing to ‘other team’
- No Minor Parties
 - 62% of Americans want a viable 3rd party
 - 2-3% are willing to vote for them
 - Why vote for someone you know will lose?

Voters don't want to waste votes.

Voting System is the Problem

- Allows for the “spoiler” effect
- Fails to require majority support
- Discourages new candidates
- Restricts your choice and your voice

Ranked Choice Voting is the Solution

Instead of choosing one candidate, you **rank** your **choices** in the order **you want**.

Winner must win a **majority**, not just a **plurality**.

How Do We Choose the Winner?

The only way to win in a ranked choice contest is by gaining the **majority of votes**. This happens either right away or in **“Instant Runoffs.”**

Here's how it works

- 5 candidates, one with majority support

Round 1



55%



30%



8%



5%



2%

Count only the 1st choice votes.

Majority in First Round!

What if there isn't a majority?

- 5 candidates, none with majority support

Round 1



35%



25%



19%



12%



9%

Count only the 1st choice votes.

No Majority in First Round

Here's how it changes the system

- 4 candidates left, still none with majority support

Round 2



35%

+0%



25%

+4%



19%

+3%



12%

+2%



9%



Take the votes from last place and redistribute.

No Majority in Second Round

Keep going

- 3 candidates left, still none with majority support

Round 3



Take the votes from last place and redistribute.

No Majority in Third Round

Almost there

- 2 candidates left, still none with majority support

Round 4

Take the votes from last place and redistribute.

No Majority in Fourth Round

Final Result

- A majority is found!

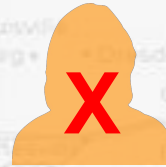

A New Culture of Campaigns

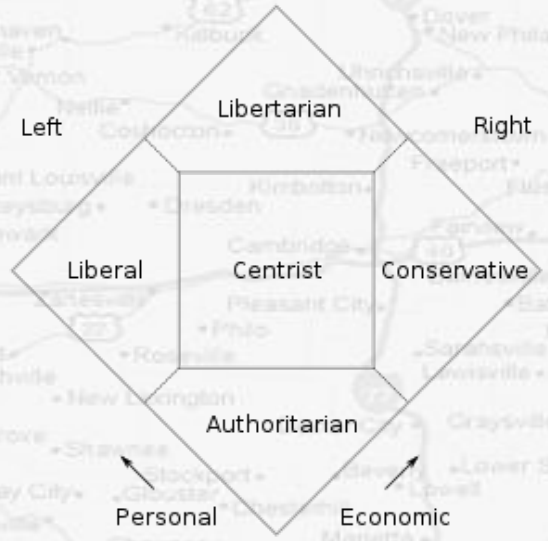
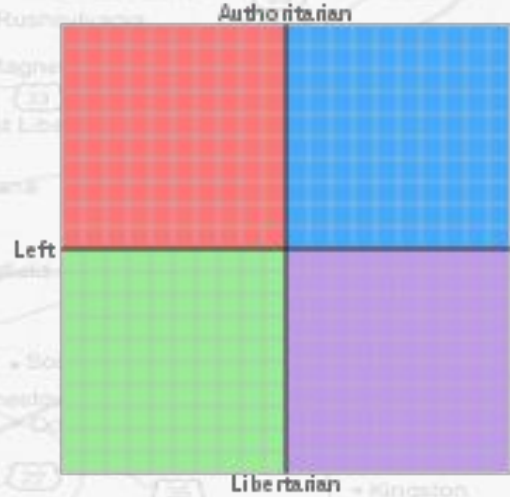
- **No more hate campaigns**
 - Campaigning with opponents
- **Must appeal to wide range of voters**
 - Need to win 2nd choice
- **Candidates must consider how they will rank even with voters outside their base**

- Gives voters more **choice** and more **voice**

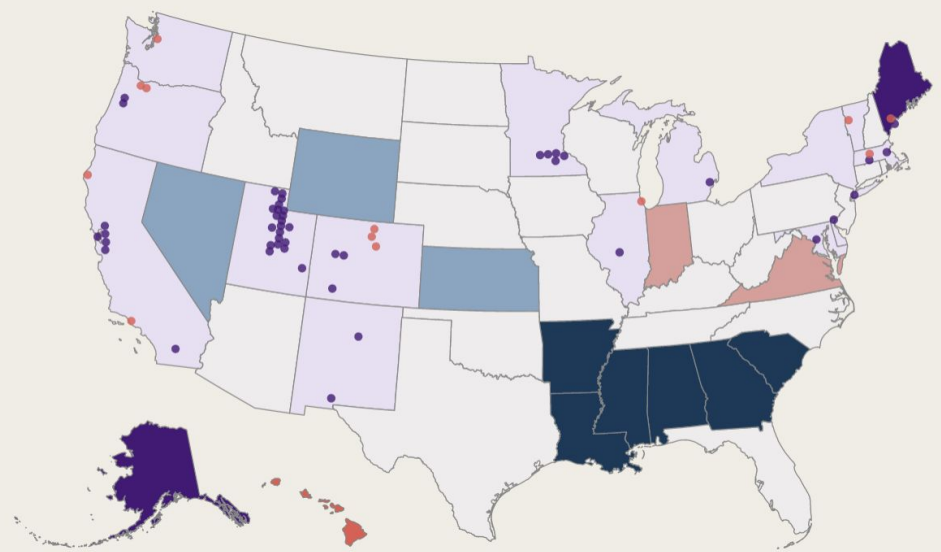

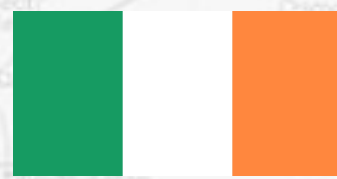
- **Maine and Alaska are the first states to use RCV statewide**

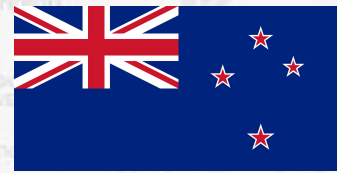
